consin Realtors Association from 1965 to 1968, president of the Walworth County Realtors Association from 1970-72 and as a director of the Walworth State Bank since 1973. He and his wife, Cynthia, have four children.

Sjoberg said Rauland carries a quote in his wallet that reads, "God will not look you over for medals, degrees or diplomas, but for scars." "Bob doesn't ask for honors or medals for the things he does," Sjoberg added. "He's happy to be part of the community."

Karon White-Gibson

Joy Catterson introduced the Citizen of the Year for Williams Bay, Karon White-Gibson.

"Karon was a pioneer nurse in developing home care services for the middle class. In 1973, she developed a very successful business in health care and was named Chicago Business-woman of the Year by the National Association of Women Business Owners, was featured in People Magazine

and named Small Business of the Year by a national accounting firm.

"She has been a volunteer since her days as a teenage candystriper. For the last 22 years she has used her own time and money to produce and host a television talk show featuring traditional, alternative and optional health care solutions for the consumer.

"White-Gibson is also co-author of the book, "Nurses On Our Own," an inspiring true story of challenges in nursing.

She, her detective husband and his partner, developed a program to teach seniors, parents and children how to avoid becoming the target of crime. CBS TV called them 'hometown heroes.'

White-Gibson is also a finalist for the Nursing Excellence Award and was nominated for a cable access award for her Golf for Juniors show.
